- a) Don't Panic: You Can Keep Using Windows 10 Until 2025 by Benj Edwards, 07.16.21. "You can keep using your current PC hardware safely with Windows 10 for at least four more years. Microsoft has set the end date of Windows 10 support to October 14, 2025. After that point, Windows 10 will no longer receive new security updates from Microsoft, and Windows 10 will be considered 'end-oflife'. If you have a PC from late 2017 or older (about four years old), right now, that PC will be at least eight years old when Microsoft stops supporting Windows 10 in 2025." - b) "Ransomware is known for encrypting your data and holding it hostage. It turns out that it can do more that backups won't protect against...ransomware is evolving. It's important to understand what it's evolving into, and what you need to do, if anything, to defend yourself...the folks behind ransomware have modified their approach slightly. It's become a two-step process:
 - 1- Steal a copy of all your data.
 - 2- Encrypt your data.

This means they've taken your data hostage: they threaten to release their copy of your data publicly unless you pay the ransom."

Read the article to find out more about this and how to protect yourself. "...backups won't protect you from absolutely everything — nothing can. But backups protect you from so many different types of threats and failures, you simply must keep doing them."
