Speaker Profiles:

Ian Hanna: Northwest Certified Forestry

Ian is a forest products market development expert, with a broad background in ecosystem forestry, small-scale manufacturing, FSC market development, and wood product sales. Prior to joining the Northwest Natural Resource Group in June of 2004, Ian provided market and business development consulting for clients involved in FSC and other regional certification programs. His experience includes national level market development for FSC and reclaimed wood products as a regional manager for Certified Wood & Paper Association and Certified Forest Products Council. Ian also co-founded Windfall Lumber in Olympia, one of the first FSC businesses in western Washington.

Kirk Hanson: Northwest Certified Forestry

Kirk is a small forest landowner with a 30-acre tree farm near Oakville, Washington where he manages a regenerating forest and develops experimental agroforestry systems. He has worked on strategies for combining rural economic development with environmental enhancement in the Pacific Northwest for over 10 years. Kirk previously worked for the DNR's Small Forest Landowner Office assisting landowners with identifying financial and technical assistance programs. He has also worked for a private fisheries consulting firm developing riparian agroforestry systems for working farms. Kirk is currently the South Sound Regional Director for Northwest Certified Forestry.

John Henrikson: Wild Thyme Farm

John is the owner of the Wild Thyme Farm, a 160 acre farm and woodland in the Chehalis Valley. Over the past 20 years John has developed strategies for sustainably managing his forest and farmland and to add value to the products from the farm. He has implemented riparian reforestation practices; forest health and quality improvements; value-added wood production; organic orchard, garden and agroforestry practices; and other forms of sustainable land use management.

Mark Bowman: Shorebank Enterprise

Mark is the Vice President and Loan Officer for the North Olympic Peninsula, WA region of ShoreBank Enterprise Cascadia (SBEC), a non-profit affiliate of ShoreBank Corporation of Chicago, IL. He has been with SBEC for two years working on loans to small business owners and consulting with non-profits. SBEC promotes conservation based development in coastal communities in Oregon and Washington and is headquartered in Ilwaco, WA.

Doug Mason: <u>Jefferson Land Trust</u>

Doug Mason is an attorney in Port Townsend WA. In 1989 he was one of the founders of Jefferson Land Trust (JLT). He was a JLT board member and officer for ten years and continues to act as legal counsel. He drafted all of the conservation easements held by JLT. Doug was also formerly King County Manager for Cascade Land Conservancy, a major regional land trust. Jefferson LandWorks Collaborative, in which JLT is a partner, is ensuring that resource lands under development pressure remain available to future generations for productive uses, often employing conservation easements as a tool.

Paul Valentine: Forestland Resources

Paul Valentine is an Associate Broker with Forestland Resources a division of Hodges Gilliam and Dana Investment Real Estate specializing in outdoor properties. Paul has been in real estate since 1992 after leaving the U.S. Army and has been selling everything from recreational mountain lots to large ranches and farms.
